

The police department currently employs 10 civilian employees and 93 sworn personnel.

Operations Division CAPTAIN JAMES F. HENRY

The Everett Police Department **Operations Division** consists of one Captain, six Lieutenants, eight Sergeants, and approximately fifty-four Patrol Officers. Patrol shifts rotate and consist of three ten hour shifts. The ten hour shift consists of the day shift, evening shift and the over night shift. Each shift is comprised of one Lieutenant, one Sergeant and a squad of eight to nine Officers. A Lieutenant commands each shift and the squad are led on the street by a Sergeant. All of our shifts overlap with a forty five minute overlap between the day shift and the evening shift and then a five hour overlap between nine p.m. and two a.m. During this five hour overlap, traditionally our busiest period of time, our manpower levels are doubled to address the increase in calls for service.

The Operations Division is the largest Division in the Everett Police Department. It operates year round, seven days a week twenty-four hours a day. It includes Patrol Units, Traffic Units and K-9 Units. The function of the Patrol Units is to provide uniform patrol coverage to all areas of the city. Officers conduct patrols on foot, bicycle and in motor vehicles. They respond to emergencies such as crimes in progress, motor vehicle crashes, directed patrols, injuries, illnesses and fires. They routinely arrest offenders, investigate citizen complaints, provide traffic control and enforcement, appear in court, and attend community based meetings. Officers are engaged during down time with Walk and Talks directed towards areas of concern to the community and report writing.

The primary goal of the Operations Division is the prevention of crime and disorder by adhering to community policing principals which have been adopted by the Everett Police Department. Under this philosophy Officers are assigned to designated areas of the city, called sectors and each Officer has a responsibility of addressing the concerns in the area with the assistance of specialized units and community members.

Traffic and K-9 Units assist Patrol Units in calls for service but also are engaged in other duties. Traffic personnel conduct targeted enforcement in neighborhoods, provide escorts for a variety of events, investigate hit and runs, coordinate field sobriety checkpoints and other educational outreach within the community. K-9 Units consist of a handler and assigned dog trained in a variety of functions. The Everett Police Department has two K-9 Units, one used for patrol and drug detection and the other for explosives and firearms evidence recovery.

The Operations Division additionally provides service to the community by responding to Emergency 911 calls on a daily basis. Annually, the Everett Police Department receives approximately 26,132 calls for service. Of the 26,132 calls received, approximately 4,300 are documented as incidents requiring reports. The department also responds to an average of 1,150 motor vehicle crashes per year, and arrests an average of 1,600 individuals annually.



**Criminal Investigations Division
Captain Robert Bontempo**

The Everett Police Department **Criminal Investigation Division (CID)** investigates criminal activities that occur in the City of Everett or have an effect on the City of Everett and its residents. In 2009, the CID investigated over 680 cases and monitored crime trends in the city and surrounding metropolitan Boston area.

The CID's 11 Detectives are assigned to both the Criminal Investigations Unit and Special Criminal Investigations Unit and they work closely with investigators from other local, state and Federal agencies and regularly share personnel resources and information. CID personnel are also affiliated with several taskforces that have been established to address specific types of crimes such as narcotics distribution. CID personnel regularly carry caseloads that involve crimes such as, burglaries, housebreaks, bank robberies, MV theft, computer/cyber crime, larceny, financial crimes as well as warrant apprehension and follow up on domestic violence and sexual assault cases.

A detective is assigned to handle all sex offender registry issues as well as the follow up of all missing persons.

Special Criminal investigations Unit (SCIU)

Everett Police hosts a Crime Prevention group that meets the third Tuesday of every month at 7 PM at police headquarters. All are welcome.

The SCIU mission is to suppress overt and covert drug dealing, prostitution and other types of crimes of a sensitive nature. The SCIU accomplishes their mission by targeting street level and midlevel drug dealing through the use of undercover Officers, Confidential Informants, and decoys. The unit is additionally involved with task forces at the federal level, which are comprised of Officers from other local and state agencies. Additionally, Detectives of the unit assist other agencies in their efforts to address cross-border drug distribution. Currently, there are three Detectives and one Sergeant assigned to the unit. One detective is assigned full time to the DEA task force.

2009 Initiatives and Results

The SCIU was involved with 141 arrests (**88** in Everett, **28** in Cambridge, **2** in Lawrence, **6** in Chelsea and **12** in Malden). Additionally, the following types and quantities of drugs and property were seized:

The CID disrupted a number of house breaking rings which resulted in numerous arrests and the recovery of stolen property.

In the spring of 2009, the SCIU was contacted by the Cambridge Police Department Drug Unit looking for assistance with an ongoing problem with drug dealing in the Central Square neighborhood part of their city. Based on that information, "Operation Central Crack Down" began. The SCIU provided an experienced undercover Officer to try to infiltrate the drug dealers operating in that area. After a four month long investigation, the undercover Officer was able to make drug purchases from 28 different individuals who were later arrested and charged with various counts of distribution of crack cocaine, heroin, oxycontin, and marijuana.

During the later part of 2009, SCIU Detectives received information that a City of Everett employee was stealing quarters from the parking meters in Everett. This investigation took numerous man hours of covert surveillance to complete. Once enough probable cause was established, Detectives were issued search warrants for the person, vehicle, and house of the city employee. The employee was subsequently arrested and charged with numerous counts of larceny over \$250.00 and larceny under \$250.00.

Also during 2009, the SCIU was approached by the Chelsea Drug Unit looking for assistance to help shut down two crack houses in the Bellingham square area. The SCIU provided an undercover Officer who was able to make purchases of crack cocaine from two houses that were right next to one another. It should also be noted that customers from Everett were going to these houses and selling the cocaine back in Everett. The Chelsea Drug Unit was able to get two search warrants for these two houses because of the undercover Officer's ability to purchase drugs from six separate individuals who were later arrested.

The **EVAPorate Violence Project** is also part of the CID. In 2009, EVAPorate Violence served the following people impacted by domestic violence:

212 individuals received Victim Advocacy that included: (a) intake; (b) liaison with financial, educational and employment institutions and with the Department of Children & Families; (c) transportation to district, municipal and superior courts; (d) support counseling; (e) housing application assistance; and (f) other need-based services (of this number, 36 people were referred to Portal To Hope for emergency, short-term shelter).

372 Abuse Prevention Orders were applied for in 2009, and of this number 114 women and 10 men received assistance with said orders, court advocacy and document preparation (of this number, 82 people were referred to Portal To Hope for more comprehensive Legal Aid Services and other support). Additionally, there are 153 Abuse Prevention Orders that require commitments through 2010.

436 Everett High School Students received Violence Prevention Training via EVAPorate Violence's ongoing partnership with the Everett Public Schools. Three Literature Drops were conducted to promote EVAPorate Violence in residential areas reporting the highest number of domestic violence cases; two Community Violence Prevention Education/Outreach events were facilitated; two Salem State College Interns assisted and received training via EVAPorate Violence; and four Youth assisted in community services and received training.

Crime Analysis

Crime analysis involves the use of systematic analysis for identifying and analyzing patterns and trends in crime. The information collected on trends and patterns can help law enforcement agencies deploy resources in a more effective manner, and assist Detectives in identifying and apprehending suspects. Another goal of crime analysis is to create solutions to crime problems, and develop crime prevention strategies. Crime analysts study crime reports, arrests reports, information from other agencies, and police calls for service to identify emerging patterns, series, and trends in a timely manner.

Our **Crime Analyst** also issues bulletins, reports, and alerts to the Everett Police Department and other agencies statewide. In addition, our analyst also: prepares statistics, completes data queries, creates maps on request, prepares information for community meetings, answers questions from the public and the press, and participates in regional information sharing meetings.

Crimereports.com

The Everett Police Department has joined over 500 other departments nationally (including: Malden, Medford, Boston) by posting up-to-date crime information online for public access. The police department is posting crime data daily to CrimeReports.com; the largest online resource for accurate, up-to-date crime information. The data is updated 3 times a week. **Crimereports.com** users are also able to access up-to-date sex offender registry data from the National Sex Offender Registry for any City posting data to crimereports.com. The data is updated weekly.

By using crimereports.com, the public can view crime information specific to where they live and work in one location. Crimereports.com is free to access. Information available on the site includes locations, offense types, and other pertinent information about an incident. The software allows users to select specific date ranges and crime types to be viewed. Reported criminal activity can be viewed on an easy-to-use map, and users can set electronic alerts for crimes occurring close to their home or business. Users are also able to access on-line info about other agencies connected to the program. Crimereports.com allows people to get a realistic look at what issues the city faces.

The site can be accessed through www.crimereports.com, select MA, and then Everett; or the city's site can be accessed through a link posted on the Everett Police Department's website (<http://everettpolicema.com/>).

Special Services Division
Captain Richard Basteri

The **Special Services Division (SSD)** of the Everett Police Department has many responsibilities, including juvenile crimes, gang investigations, school resource Officers, community relations, Homeland Security and Emergency Management. Special Services Officers are also part of a regional Gang Task Force with nine other communities and several Federal agencies, which is funded under the Charles E. Shannon community safety grant. Lastly, the SSD offers two specialized units to support the Operations Division, the Special Operations Unit (SOU), which is a trained and equipped tactical team to deal with high risk warrant service and barricaded subjects, and the Underwater Search and Recovery Unit, which is a team of trained and equipped divers to respond to emergencies and missions on our waterfront.

The **Community Services Unit** consists of one Sergeant and three Patrolmen. Two Officers have a dual role. They are assigned as School Resource Officers (SRO) and are placed in the High School in partnership with the Everett Public Schools to increase safety in the schools and to develop an open ongoing dialogue between the youths and the police department. The Officers assigned as SROs have been trained and certified in their special classification and on occasion will help out with issues in the cities remaining middle schools. SRO's attend bi-weekly Juvenile Justice meetings with school officials, juvenile probation, mental health professionals, the Middlesex District Attorney's Office, and assist school administrators with grades K to 8.

These same Officers that are assigned as SRO's split their time with the Gang Unit and are responsible for patrolling hot spot areas of the city, including parks and playgrounds. These Officers also identify and disrupt gang activity and youth related incidents, conduct follow up investigations, work with the Metro Gang Task Force, attend community meetings and assist with community and neighbor problems.

The department dedicates a community services Officer to work with the business community. This Officer is responsible for patrolling the mall and square areas. The Officer provides a visible deterrent to crime and offers strategies to reduce the likelihood of victimization to these areas. This Officer also attends community meetings and assists with community and neighborhood problems.

An additional Officer is assigned to the **Marine Patrol Unit**. The Officer is involved in ongoing homeland security and emergency management related functions. Additionally, this Officer works in conjunction with regional partners in the planning and preparation of responses to terrorist related incidents. In 2009, the Dive Unit assisted by the Marine Unit completed seven training dives, thirteen security dives at the LNG facility, and two mutual aid dives. The SOU assisted the SCIU on the execution of a few search warrants without incident.



**Administrative Services Division
Captain Patrick McAdam**

The **Administrative Services Division** of the Everett Police Department includes the Court Liaison Officer, Central Records, and the Animal Control Officer. This Division is responsible for scheduling and logging all training completed by Everett Police.

Over 6,400 hours of training were completed by sworn members of the Everett police department in 2009. All department members complete annual in-service training (examples: CPR, First Aid, legal updates, elderly and juvenile matters, defensive tactics). Some members receive specialized training in a number of different areas including: underwater search and recovery, interview and interrogation, fingerprinting, and terrorism response. Additionally, Officers are required to participate in various online classes and trainings.

Three interns from various colleges in Massachusetts completed course requirements through the Everett Police Department (about 410 hours combined). During their internships, the students learned about the various arms of the police department, shadowed Detectives, patrolman, the crime analyst, and other members of the department. The interns also went to the range and on ride-a-longs.

The **Court Liaison Officer (CLO)** for the department interacts on a daily basis with the District Attorney and the courts various departments, such as the clerk and probation. The CLO reviews all reports submitted by the departments Officers ranging from arrest or warrants to criminal complaints. Additionally, the Officer is responsible for the scheduling and appearance of Officers in the Commonwealth's various courts.

The **Detail/Assignments Officer** is responsible for assigning Officers to work with public and private contactors on various projects throughout the city. Additionally, the Officer is responsible for proper billing and accounts receivable; and for helping to plan the staffing needs at large scale events.

The **Central Records Bureau** is where all police related records are maintained and stored. Clerks in the records bureau respond to numerous requests for documents such accident reports, police reports, daily arrest, and incident logs. Additionally, all traffic citations are entered into our records management system through personnel assigned to this bureau.

The **Animal Control Officer (ACO)** is in charge of all facets related to domesticated and wild animals throughout the city. The ACO helps identify lost or injured animal, and enforces city ordinances related to animal issues.





Selected Trend Data for NIBRS Offenses 2005-2009⁴







All Fraud Related Offenses 2005-2009




Larceny/Theft Related Offenses 2005-2009

Offenses with Notable Change in Number of Incidents Reported

Table includes those crimes that have had a notable percent change in their reporting. Percent change looks at the number of crimes reported in 2009 by crime type and compares that number to the average number of crimes that were reported over the past five years. The resulting percentage change validates any trends that may be present in the 2009 data.

Highlights:

1. The drop in the total number of offenses reported in 2009 when compared to 2008 is significant. However, the percent change suggests that though significant, the number of crimes reported in 2009 is closer to the average than the number reported in 2008.
2. The crime types that had the most significant decline in 2009 are: prostitution, forcible-rape, pick pocketing, vandalism offenses, stolen property offenses, all other larcenies, and MV thefts.
3. The crime types that had the most significant increase in 2009 are: robbery, credit card fraud, drug equipment violations, theft of MV parts and accessories, impersonation, and weapons laws violations.




In 2009, **26,132** calls for service were logged by the Everett Police Department⁶


- 28,088 action codes were utilized (each call can have more than 1 incident type attached).
